Our main objective is to develop capacity and create synergies among the extensive network of Tidy Towns groups and SEC's in Ireland - empowering them to deliver Sustainability and Biodiversity projects.

The Network will deliver a series of Sustainability & Biodiversity workshops across the Midlands in 2025 & 2026, together with SEAI County Mentors and Consultants from Woodrow

Environmental Consulting. Workshops will include details of the Tidy Town's Biodiversity and Sustainability adjudication categories and visits to local sites and projects.

The first workshop will take place on 20th September 2025 - in Lanesborough, Co Longford. Workshops are scheduled for October/November in Laois, Offaly, Roscommon & Westmeath. All community organisations are welcome to attend.

Castlebar Tidy Towns Celebrates 30 Years of Community Spirit

Not even a wet and windy winter evening could dampen the spirits of those attending the Castlebar Tidy Towns Awards night. With standing-room-only, the community gathered to mark the group's 30th anniversary and honour the dedication of individuals and organisations working tirelessly to make Castlebar a better place to live, work, and play.

The Castlebar Tidy Towns Awards night was a fitting celebration of community pride, environmental stewardship, and three decades of dedicated effort. Photos of all prize winners on the night are included below:



























Cloontuskert Old Playground

Cloontuskert village is the only original Bord na Móna village in county Roscommon and as such, is a key feature of the architectural heritage of the county. Cloontuskert's surrounding landscape is dominated by the extensive tracts of bogland located in the area. It is to this feature that the Cloontuskert housing scheme owes its formation. In 1953 the scheme was officially opened as one of the original Bord na Móna villages which catered for the families of workers who came from all over Ireland to gain employment on the bogs.



We believe that the importance of the architectural, industrial and cultural heritage of the Bord na Móna villages in Ireland is a key part of our national story. Cloontuskert Tidy Towns has completed much work in recent years in promoting our home village and bringing its importance to a wider audience, which was advanced through our collaboration with the wonderful Irish Architecture Foundation and Creative Ireland in the form of the Reimagine Workers' Villages project which began here in Cloontuskert in 2021, a programme funded by Creative Ireland's Climate Action Fund.





A recent publication "Irish Housing Design 1950–1980" sets out the extent of the number of references in contemporary writing to the architectural, historical and social significance of the Bord na Móna villages. The Bord na Móna housing schemes were designed by the architect and visionary, Frank Gibney. We have been in contact with the author of "Ambition and Achievement: The Civic Visions of Frank Gibney", Fergal MacCabe, Tullamore born architect and town planner, who recommended in his book that all Frank Gibney's villages should be designated as Architectural Conservation Areas.

A key design feature that Bord na Móna provided during the early days of their seven villages was a playground for the children of the Bord na Móna workers. We have been kindly provided with these amazing photographs of Cloontuskert's 'Old Playground' dating to circa. the 1970s by Cloontuskert native, Ruth Trimble (Malone). Perhaps these images will bring back some nice childhood memories for your readers around the country, particularly those who may have grown up in a Bord na Móna village themselves".

Pride in Drumshanbo Tidy Towns

Our committee decided to install art on the electrical boxes in town and invited local young woman Shona Grunewald to be the first artist to create this work. Shona is a 25-year-old, she is part of our autistic community and has an honour degree in Graphic Design from Athlone. We went step further and arranged to have Shona's very first art exhibition at our Drumshanbo Credit Union. She exhibited a range of work for sale, as well providing prints and stickers promoting herself & Tidy Towns. Next year we have a series of artwork from our secondary students as well as out national school children. It's all part of our future "Heritage & Art Trail".

Look out for bright, inventive and youthful touches throughout Drumshanbo in 2025.





Westport TidyTowns - The Journey of Westport Window Boxes and Hanging Baskets

In this issue, I thought we would look at our window boxes. They do not just appear overnight, and so I thought I would share the process with you.

Firstly, meetings with Westport and Belmullet Municipal District, The Westport Chamber, and the DSP and a meeting with the County Council to get permission







for flower displays and assistance with maintenance. Then we must get quotes from our suppliers making sure all baskets are as biodiversity friendly as possible. A letter is sent out to all Westport businesses that have supported the scheme previously from our Tidy Towns Office. New businesses or those who wish to get involved in future, should send an email of interest to chamber@westportireland.com

A small extract of the letter is as follows.

"Westport Tidy Towns Committee, in association with Westport and Belmullet Municipal District, The Westport Chamber, and the DSP will be continuing its Floral Display Project in the town centre this year.

The visual effect of the window box displays has been a contributing factor to Westport's success in previous years in the National Tidy Towns Awards.

Window boxes will be erected for the ground and first floor only.

Westport and Belmullet Municipal District Council has agreed to water them on a regular basis over the summer months ensuring continuous flowering."

When we have received paid requests, we order from two local garden centres, they will plant them up and keep them for a month to nurture them.

The suppliers then deliver the boxes to The Octagon where teams from the TUS and Ce Schemes, West Mayo Municipal Council and The Westport Tidy Towns team unload the lorries and place in front of the relevant business. All the other boxes are taken to the Council depot and with the help of workers, cherry pickers and ladders are distributed and the baskets are put up whilst always adhering to strict safety precautions. There are at least four hundred window boxes and baskets, so you can imagine how big a task it is. All of this takes at least two weeks and co-ordination between all parties is done by Elsie Higgins and Liam Campion.

The floral arrangements are watered every week by council staff and one dedicated Tidy Towns person, a feeding schedule is also organized and administered as well

Boxes are taken down at the end of September and Elsie also organizes repairs of the boxes and baskets and reuses the compost and bulbs in planters around town where possible. The boxes are then stored by Elsie until the following year.

Glounthaune TidyTowns

Glounthaune Tidy Santa's Reindeers located every year now at the Centenary Garden on the L3004. This is sited every year here and is an iconic part of the festive spirit in Glounthaune to all the Community. It is a combined effort by the Men's Shed /GTT and the Transition Year Students who do hours for us each year.





Castleknock TidyTowns. Environmental, Sustainability and Climate Action Group

TidyTowns is a very well-known brand in Ireland and has been around since 1958. Its annual nationwide competition has a unique place in Ireland's culture as it has become the country's best-known



sustainable and environmental initiative. The primary focus of TidyTowns is to encourage communities to improve their local environment and make their area a better place to live, work and visit by practical and creative ways of enhancing their towns and villages.

In recent times an increased emphasis has been placed on matters such as climate change and sustainability. In response to these challenges and to highlight Castleknock TidyTowns concentration on addressing these issues we have added a tagline in the colour of green to our logo which now reads "Castleknock TidyTowns. Environmental, Sustainability and Climate Action Group."

We hope by emphasising our environmental, sustainability and climate action credentials we can make people aware we do much more than just enhance the appearance of our neighbourhood as we strive to address the problems that threaten our planet. By way of example over the past few years we have planted over 2,000 trees in our neighbourhood, added 12 pollinator-friendly flower beds and set up the Castleknock Community Cycle Facebook page, which has over 3,200 local members and enabled the recycling of over 7,000 pre-owned items which have been donated for free and saved from landfill. Our recent very successful Castleknock Poster-Free Zone initiative will result in hundreds of election posters







and plastic cables ties also being saved from landfill. These are just a few of the very many projects we have instigated.

Our enhanced logo with the new green tagline is intended to clearly convey our brand values, be meaningful, create a lasting impression, gain attention and support for our aims, while appealing to a younger demographic who wish to play their part in caring for our planet. It enables us communicate our mission, purpose and culture while attempting to enlist support, especially from young adult volunteers, to help us achieve our goals.
