

There are still challenges ahead as we continue to live with Covid and with the increases in living costs but the resilience shown by communities and TidyTowns groups in particular during these times is heartening.



I was very pleased to meet with so many TidyTowns volunteers at the national awards ceremony in October in the RDS where Trim in County Meath were named as Ireland's Tidiest Town for 2022. Thank You to the 882 towns and villages who entered this year and congratulations to all our winners.

At the ceremony, I was delighted to announce a funding package of €1.4 Million to support you, the TidyTowns volunteers, in the year ahead as you all prepare for the 2023 competition. This will bring the total funding provided by my department since 2017 to €8.1 Million. This demonstrates the value Government and indeed, my Department has on the work TidyTowns groups carry out in areas such as biodiversity, sustainability and in addressing the challenges, we face through climate change.

I look forward to launching the 2023 SuperValu TidyTowns competition in the New Year and to working with our sponsor SuperValu who will continue their sponsorship for the competition out to 2027.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank you the volunteers once again for your support and to wish you and your families a very happy and peaceful Christmas and hoping 2023 is a healthy, happy and prosperous year for you all.

Our Rural Future: Minister Humphreys announces details of €1.4 million in funding for TidyTowns Groups

Minister encourages Tidy Towns committees to avail of funding for 2023 projects of Grants between €1,000- €4000 for 935 groups with Emphasis on projects that promote green spaces, parks and biodiversity.

Minister for Rural and Community Development, Heather Humphreys TD, has recently announced the details of €1.4 million in funding to support TidyTowns groups prepare for the 2023 SuperValu TidyTowns competition.

As part of the initiative, grants of between €1,000 and €4,000 will be provided to 935 TidyTowns groups right across the country. Groups who entered the SuperValu TidyTowns competition in 2021 or 2022 will be eligible.

Minister Humphreys today published the details of how Tidy Towns committees can avail of the funding and encouraged all eligible groups to apply.

The SuperValu TidyTowns competition has been in existence since 1958. It continues to grow and attract new entrants each year. 882 towns and villages entered the competition this year. At the national awards ceremony in October, Minister Humphreys declared Trim in County Meath as Ireland's Tidiest Town for 2022.

Speaking about the funding to support groups entering the 2023 SuperValu TidyTowns competition, Minister Humphreys said:

“This week I wrote to all Tidy Towns Groups across the country and thanked them for their work and dedication to their community. The efforts of the thousands of volunteers make our towns more vibrant and better places to live, work and raise a family. “

“I want to support our Tidy Towns Groups in preparing for next year's competition and today I am delighted to announce the detail of the €1.4 million in funding which I confirmed at the event in the RDS in October. The funding of between €1,000 and €4,000 is being provided to groups to assist them in preparing for the 2023 Competition, the 65th anniversary of the SuperValu TidyTowns competition, but no sign of retirement on it – it's stronger it's getting”

“Today I am encouraging groups availing of the funding to look at projects for their green spaces and parks, and projects that are sensitive to our biodiversity and promote sustainable living. I am confident that this funding can help further support such initiatives.”

All eligible groups will be contacted before Christmas to confirm their funding. Applications for funding must be returned to Pobal no later than February 28th 2023. Late applications will not be accepted. All projects and initiatives funded through this support must be completed by July 31st, 2023.

Looking ahead to next year, the Minister said; “I want to take this opportunity to thank the thousands and thousands of TidyTowns volunteers that have given of their time and skills so generously over the years. I am confident that the funding provided by my Department in recent years, in addition to the funding I am referring to today, has made and will continue to make, a real difference in the towns and villages of Ireland.”

Ballivor TidyTowns Co. Meath

Noel French from Ballivor TidyTowns got in touch to advise us about our thermostats and we can make some very valuable changes.

In November as the winter season approached Ballivor TidyTowns provided temperature gauges free at local shop outlets in Ballivor. “By lowering your thermostats you can reduce your bill but you can also reduce your carbon footprint.

Set the room thermostat to 18°C and then turn it up by one degree each day until you find a temperature you are comfortable with. But be sure that the temperature does not drop below 16°C for elderly people and those with impaired mobility.

Your heating bill can be reduced by 10% by simply lowering the thermostat by just one degree. Turn the thermostat for your living areas down to 20°C. The temperature in hallways and bedrooms should be cooler, ideally between 15-18°C.

A Ballivor TidyTowns spokesperson thanked Meath County Council for providing the temperature gauges. The council also provides a Home Energy Saving Kit which is available to borrow from the local libraries.

Cllr Nick Killian, Cathaoirleach of Meath County Council, who launched the initiative congratulated Ballivor TidyTowns on their contribution to their community and wished them well with their project.

Going home for Christmas

Mikey had left Ireland in the late 50s he often talked of that February morning when he left home. It was a very frosty morning his dad and mam were so lonely dad kept wiping his nose he said he had a cold. Mam kept staring out the window but Mikey was full of excitement. The thought of all the great things fellas had said about London. Bright lights, nightclubs and loose women. Life would never again be the same. 25 years on he still wondered would things be the same when he got back.

He got work on the building sites and that was what he did for the rest of his time. He soon got to know all the Irish clubs and bars. He went to the Galtymore most weekends. It was here he met Rose O'Brien from Mayo a student nurse they fell in love and married on March 17th 2 years later. They were madly in love and then tragedy struck. Rose got killed by a bus while crossing the road Mikey was never the same. He worked all week and most weekends drank himself stupid. He lost most of his friends he seldom wrote a letter home except birthdays for mam and dad when he would send them a few pounds.

They were always asking when would he come home for a holiday. They longed to see him and indeed Mikey felt the same way. Many a time he saved money for a holiday and then spent it on drink. But this time it was going to be different. He was going home this Christmas he would surprise mam and dad. He had set the date December 17th the excitement was building up.

He took down the tin box to check the money he had been saving. He held it tightly in his hand when suddenly he got a pain in his chest. He held on to the tin box as sweat fell from his brow. He fell to the ground and he pressed his emergency button on his chest as he gasped for breath. Noel his friend came around and dialled 999 while Mikey struggled to breath. Mikey was rushed to Frimley Park hospital and there he spent Christmas thinking of Rose his wife and his mam and dad in Ireland. He remembered how dad would hang his grey woollen socks on the crane as mam gave out about the smell. He remembered them saying the rosary and shaking holy water. He left hospital the end of January and seemed to be doing ok. But alas he suffered a stroke and struggled for the next few weeks. He said he would go home for Easter but it wasn't to be. He died and was buried in Greenford Cemetery on the 12th of March beside his wife Rose. An east wind was blowing at home in Ireland as his mam and dad said the rosary for the repose of his sole.

All Ireland Pollinator Plan

One third of our wild bee species are threatened with extinction from the island of Ireland. We know it is because we have drastically reduced the areas where they can nest and the amount of food our landscape provides for them. In publishing the first All-Ireland Pollinator Plan (AIPP) in 2015, Ireland became one of the first countries in Europe to address pollinator declines, and the Plan has since gained international acclaim. The first AIPP was developed from the grass roots up, to ensure we have an island that's better for biodiversity; better for pollinators; better for us; and better for future generations. It is a shared action plan. Together, we can collectively take steps to restore our pollinator populations to healthy levels.

A 15-member all-island steering group provide oversight of the All-Ireland Pollinator Plan. The Plan is managed by the National Biodiversity Data Centre. The National Biodiversity Data Centre is funded by The Heritage Council and the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage. It is a programme of The Heritage Council.

The 81 actions in the first AIPP for 2015-2020 were delivered. In the first phase we wanted to ensure that everyone understood what pollinators need, and what simple, evidence-based actions they can take to help. Extensive guidelines were developed for everyone from farmers to councils, communities, businesses, schools, sports clubs and gardens. These are all freely available at <https://pollinators.ie/>

A new version of the AIPP for 2021-2025 was published in March 2021. It is more ambitious than the first version – with more partners coming together to deliver more actions. Pollinators are better off than they were in 2015, but we still need to do more. The new plan has more than doubled our goals – with 186 actions to help biodiversity. Within the second phase, we need to engage more, monitor more, and manage more land for biodiversity.



The Local Authority Pollinator Award was successfully run in the TidyTowns competition in 2022. Every year, the standard of entries is growing and the committee behind the award continue to be inspired by what is being achieved. The award was introduced in 2016 and over 200 TidyTowns groups have entered the special pollinator award since then.

In addition to the overall winner, this award identifies large and small-town winners within each of the four Tidy Towns regions. Since 2021, we have also introduced an award for the best newcomer. Congratulations to Cobh in Co Cork who won the overall award in 2022. Other winners were; Best newcomer: Cratloe TidyTowns

Large town winners were; Midlands & East – Skerries TidyTowns , South & Mid West – Cobh TidyTowns , South East – Clonmel TidyTowns & North West & West – Buncrana TidyTowns. Small town winners were; Midlands & East – Geashill TidyTowns, South & Mid West – Castlegregory TidyTowns, South East – Tullahought TidyTowns & North West West – Belcarra TidyTowns .

TidyTowns groups have been instrumental in bringing life to the plan and we extend our sincere gratitude to all TidyTowns volunteers who have embraced what the plan is about and have applied it to so many of their TidyTowns projects. Keep up the great work everyone. The Bees will thank you.

Think about upcycling also, I recently saw where old Delph teapots were mounted on timber supports and used as bird feeders and bird-boxes, remember to feed the birds too especially during any colder spells.

Oliver Fitzpatrick, Manager of Tara Mines offered Dunshaughlin TidyTowns Group a number of trees which they were removing from their site in Navan. The donated trees were London Plane and many of those trees, once felled, would unfortunately be used for firewood. With some research and imagination the group decided to process the raw timber into public seating in the village.



Two members of the Tidy Town's Committee, Patrick Connaughton and Fiona McAuley visited a local mill where the London Plane trees for were swopped for Lebanese Cedar. Lebanese Cedar is more suited for outdoor use and, hopefully, will require little maintenance. Patrick & Fiona drew up the design & specifications for the park benches that Neill could work from.



A bench has been located at the area known as Gallow's Hill, so named following the 1798 Rebellion when the "Croppies" raided the local barracks for weapons. The seat will provide a tranquil spot for residents to relax and enjoy the natural beauty of the environs.

In Issue 7 of 2022, we brought you a work of art from **Glaslough in Co Monaghan**. Ann Mc Kenna a CE worker for Glaslough TidyTowns had just completed her Train the Trainer course. Being a budding artist, Ann was approached by some members of the local TidyTowns committee to start art classes with them in the Oakland community centre. Ann and the group put their thinking caps on, and it was decided that they would start a six-week art class.



As no one had painted a picture before, the first class was to build their confidence, have fun and go home with a completed painting, and this was exactly what they did, every one was amazed by what they had achieved. The classes went from strength to strength each week and everyone gaining more confidence in themselves and having lots of fun on the way.

The garden honours those who have sadly passed away, celebrates the community spirit and hard work of the community and reminds us of how rich Cobh is with so many places and experiences to enjoy on our Great Island.



Dromiskin Tidy Towns has had much to celebrate recently having been awarded its second Bronze Medal in the National SuperValu TidyTowns Competition and being one of only nineteen groups nationally to be awarded a Community Green Flag for its development and presentation of the Heritage Park. Developed on a village centre site, owned by the Parish and licenced to the TidyTowns committee, the Park was designed by a local Tidy Towns volunteer who is a qualified Landscape Architect, with other members using their particular skills for other aspects including landscaping, historical research, completing successful

funding applications, crafting sculptural pieces and implementing a herbicide free maintenance programme.

The Park, on its site of one third of an acre, may be a relatively small public space but it certainly packs a big punch with its permanent landscaping features, curving pathways and high quality interpretative panels highlighting the rich and varied heritage of the community.





THE STORY OF THE SOLITARY BENCH IN WESTPORT

This is an Upcycled Council Garden Bench, which was destined for the Rubbish, and with the help of a local crafts man, it has gained a new lease of life and a relaxing space for people to watch the wildlife and enjoy the Garden. Thanks to Mandy from Westport Chamber for sharing this with us and to Gemma Hensey for composing the piece.

The story of the solitary bench at the library! (F28 HE26) by Gemma Hennessy

I need to tell my story, as I'm lucky to be alive and useful. I'm only here since January 2021!

I once had a lovely patch in Westport, but I fell into disrepair and was dumped behind the council yard. I'm lucky to be still in Westport as many of my compatriots have gone to other areas along Mayo's Western seafront. I was considered useless, as much of my wood was rotten, so I had been cast aside!

A group of do gooders' -well gardeners by another name at the library got the notion that they'd like a bench so that people, could perhaps admire their work or simply sit, chat, look at the view. Even then it wasn't that easy to get me. Pat Fahy managed to retrieve me from the Council yard and then I was dumped down Quarry Lane for a while or out of the way. Then they had to get permission to be allowed to put me where I'm now -that was no easy chore. There were objections here and there but when one of the do gooders got a petition going and signatures, they go the go ahead.

The town architect had to decide exactly where it should be situated. From then on it was plain sailing. Creative Wood supplied the perfect wood, tidy town's the nuts and bolts and Simon Brown the perfect craft person. To avoid me having an occasional involuntary dip into the Mall river from night revellers I'm chained into position too.

I even saw a crow swoop down from her nest to attack one of the gardeners - rather frightening to say the least.

The many varieties of flowers during the different seasons are beautiful. I don't know all their names yet but gradually I will and appreciate the different seasons and what they may bring. I have heard that the garden has a biodiverse theme -whatever that means- and that some flowers have absolutely no pollen and others are useful for the bees and pollinating insects.



I do have a problem with litter, I do wish that people would take it with them, my patch is getting rather worn too but hopefully the gardeners will sort that out - perhaps camomile might work there.
