Kinvara Tidy Towns were delighted to be selected as SDG Champions 2024-2025 and on behalf of Kinvara Tidy Towns group, Maria Hannigan accepted our certificate for this award from the Minister for the Environment. We shall be launching our Biodiversity and Climate plan for 2024-2026 during SDG Week September 20th - 29th. We also ran SDG awareness and action workshops with three sustainability TY classes. Our earthkeeper group ran a big beach clean on the 22nd of September. Our goal is to focus on SDG awareness and identifying clear SDG goals for our community, youth and sports groups in our three year Tidy towns plan 2024 – 2027.

There are sections on the Environment, Biodiversity, Litter Picking, Sustainable Development Goals, Youth, Community and Volunteering. You can also downloads our plans for the future, sections on Recycle and Repair, Pollinator and Tree Planting and "Leave no Trace". There is also a large gallery of images of all the things we have already achieved in the Area and we are excited about adding many more in the future.

To be successful in our goals this year, it was very important to collaborate with as many different groups throughout the village. We connect with multi stakeholders, ranging from three National and Secondary Schools, Sports groups, Foroige, Scouts, Beavers and Cubs groups, ten different local environmental groups, the Dolmen Centre and many of our over 80 Community based groups on a regular basis. We also partner with the following teams within Galway County Council, Gort Area Council Office, the Environmental Council team, Biodiversity Council team, Climate Change Council team, and Heritage team.



### Moyglass TidyTowns

The last year has seen a lot of activity and progress made by Moyglass Tidy Towns group. While still a relatively small group, we have progressed several different projects within the village and laid the groundwork for some longterm developments.

This year we again focussed on two main areas -ensuring the main village area is kept tidy, cared for and attractive, and the development of the community field as a recreational, educational and bio-diverse area that all can utilise.

We have organised and run a number of litter picks and encouraged the community to look after litter and rubbish in their own areas. Each road from the village is regularly walked and cleared by local teams and this is something that we continue to encourage. We hope that eventually this can happen on a more informal basis as people get into the habit of collecting rubbish in their own local areas.

We have continued to plant and maintain flowerbeds, pots and containers throughout the village. We have also weeded, cleaned and cleared most of the visible areas in the village that have become neglected over the years. We have washed and repainted walls, cleared pathways and tidied grass verges.

The primary focus of our efforts this year, however, has been the development of the community field, in association with the Moyglass Hall Committee. The Hall Committee recently purchased the field, adjacent to the community hall and in the centre of the village for the community. Moyglass Tidy Towns have worked with the committee to develop the field as a community resource.







We are very lucky that local landscaper and horticulturist Michael Murphy is a committed member of our group, and he has driven the development of the field with his vision, ideas and very practical, hands-on know-how. The field is being developed as a long-term project and is now known as The Moyglass Meadow. We aim to develop and protect this old Irish meadow, rich in biodiversity, in the heart of our village, as a park for multiple uses including recreation, education and conservation. We have initially planted a number of native trees throughout the field. The plan is to plant several more trees each year for the next 5-10 years. In addition, we have let the native grasses grow throughout the field and have mowed pathways throughout to allow for exploration and play among the various areas of the field, including the existing wetlands area.





Michael has also led the development of the wildflower margin around the perimeter of the walkway which was such a beautiful addition last year. This has been replanted for this year and we hope for an equally impressive display as the summer progresses.

The abandoned shed at the end of the walkway has been an eyesore for a long time. This summer, we refurbished the shed with paint and murals to add some colour and interest at the end of the walkway.









A very attractive addition to the walkway is the living willow hedge and bench designed by Michael. An excellent example of using natural local materials to create a beautiful, living space that can be used by all and can also provide a great educational experience.

We have recently seen the council complete work on new footpaths in the village. This is something that we have campaigned for some time. The previous footpath was broken and intermittent making it both unsightly and dangerous.

Moyglass Tidy Towns is very grateful to everybody who has helped and assisted in any way over the past year. We are always looking for new members to join the group and we continue to welcome all help and assistance that anyone can give going forward.



### **Roscommon TidyTowns**

Here are some highlights of the year for Roscommon Tidy Towns. Over the Summer months our volunteers were very busy and working hard in preparing the town for the Tidy Town's National and Ireland's Best Kept Town competitions and now as the Autumn has arrived we are looking forward to a well-earned break. The meadow in our biodiversity site at Cruby Hill was cut in the hay making season, so with the talents of our friend Joe Cribben, it gave everyone a cheery smile when he saved the grass cuttings and made a cock of hay. He anchored it down with a traditional hay-rope or in the Irish word a Sugan. On the 18th of June we received the fantastic news that we won Ireland's Best Kept Town competition in which we were delighted with the results.

September has arrived with changing skies, the Autumn leaves falling and the wild flower seed heads filling out. It's a good time to take stock of what local wildflower seeds are available in the local meadows, hedgerows, roadside verges, woods and wasteland which can be harvested to diversify our future seed sowings. Wild strawberries still appear to delight us in our Community Garden. The garden has become a habitat for various wildlife taking up residence in bird boxes, insect hotels and a solar powered pond too.

# SDG Champions Programme 2024 – 2025



Minister Ryan has appointed 20 new organisations from across Irish society to become Sustainable Development Goal (SDG) Champions to drive forward Ireland's progress towards the SDGs.

The organisations have been selected from across the public, private, community, voluntary, youth and NGO sectors, ranging from Kinvara Tidy Towns, to Sligo Rovers, ALDI to Mayo County Council, Junk Kouture to UCD. Already, 34 organisations and groups — large and small – have become SDG Champions across the 2019–2020 and 2023–2024 programmes.

Over 90 Organisations applied to take part in the programme this year, demonstrating the growing commitment of Irish society to live up to and promote the goals which have at their heart equality, access to basic rights like clean water, clean energy, food and shelter for all, and climate justice.

In addition, this year former Champion organisations will also have the opportunity to continue promoting and progressing the SDGs as SDG Ambassadors. Developed as a complement to the SDG Champions Programme, this role will enable former Champions to continue their valuable work, contributing to the promotion, awareness-raising, and implementation of the SDGs, on local, regional and national levels.

In addition, former SDG champions have chosen to take up the role of SDG Ambassadors, continuing to raise awareness of the SDGs. Also this year, as part of a pilot project, the champions will be joined by a departmental partner, The Construction Procurement Policy Unit (CPPU) at the Office of Government Procurement (OGP) will work alongside the new champions, building partnerships and enhancing stakeholder engagement.

### SuperValu Survey Results

In 2023, TidyTowns volunteers completed 1,066,242 hours of work.

There are over 29,000 volunteers and currently 904 active committees, with more people continuing to get involved.

15% of volunteers now come from other countries - showcasing the SuperValu TidyTowns initiative as a positive example of inclusivity and diversity.

TidyTowns committees continue to support sustainability – planting 182,000 trees, 40,000 flowerpots, 200,000 square metre of flower beds, maintaining 20,000 acres of low-mow grass and over 500 acres of meadows


